 - #4 choice in 2011
 - still short on support providers
- Koha
 - 150th “committer”
 - #2 choice for libraries in 2010
 - #1 choice for libraries in 2011
 - Liblime Koha vs. Koha Koha still problematic

OCLC WMS

- WMS = Web Scale Management Service
- Leverages Worldcat
- Allows for shareable data between OCLC members
- Web-based
- Built on cooperative platform (Web+OCLC)
- Leverages e-resources management capability

GOOD NEWS

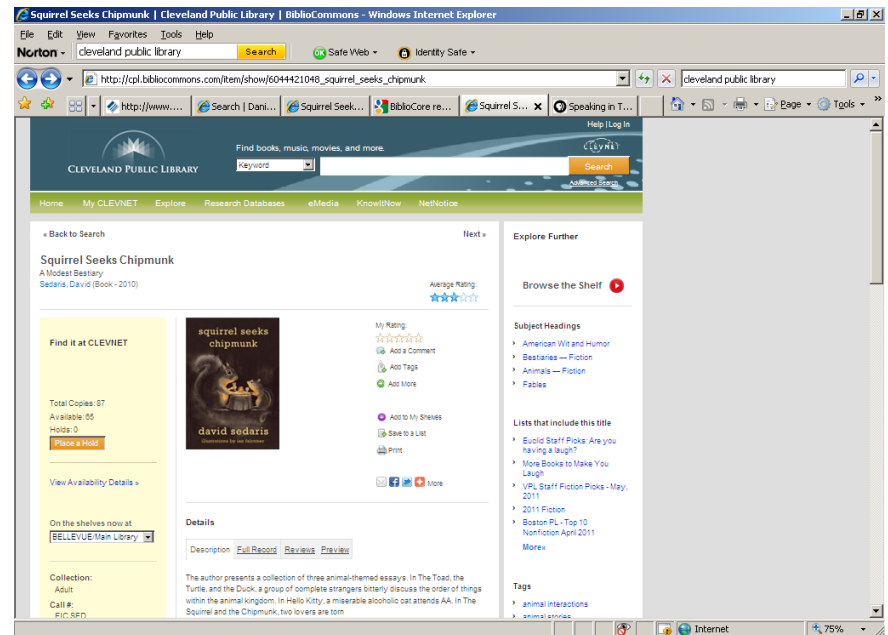
Innovative's Sierra's Services Platform

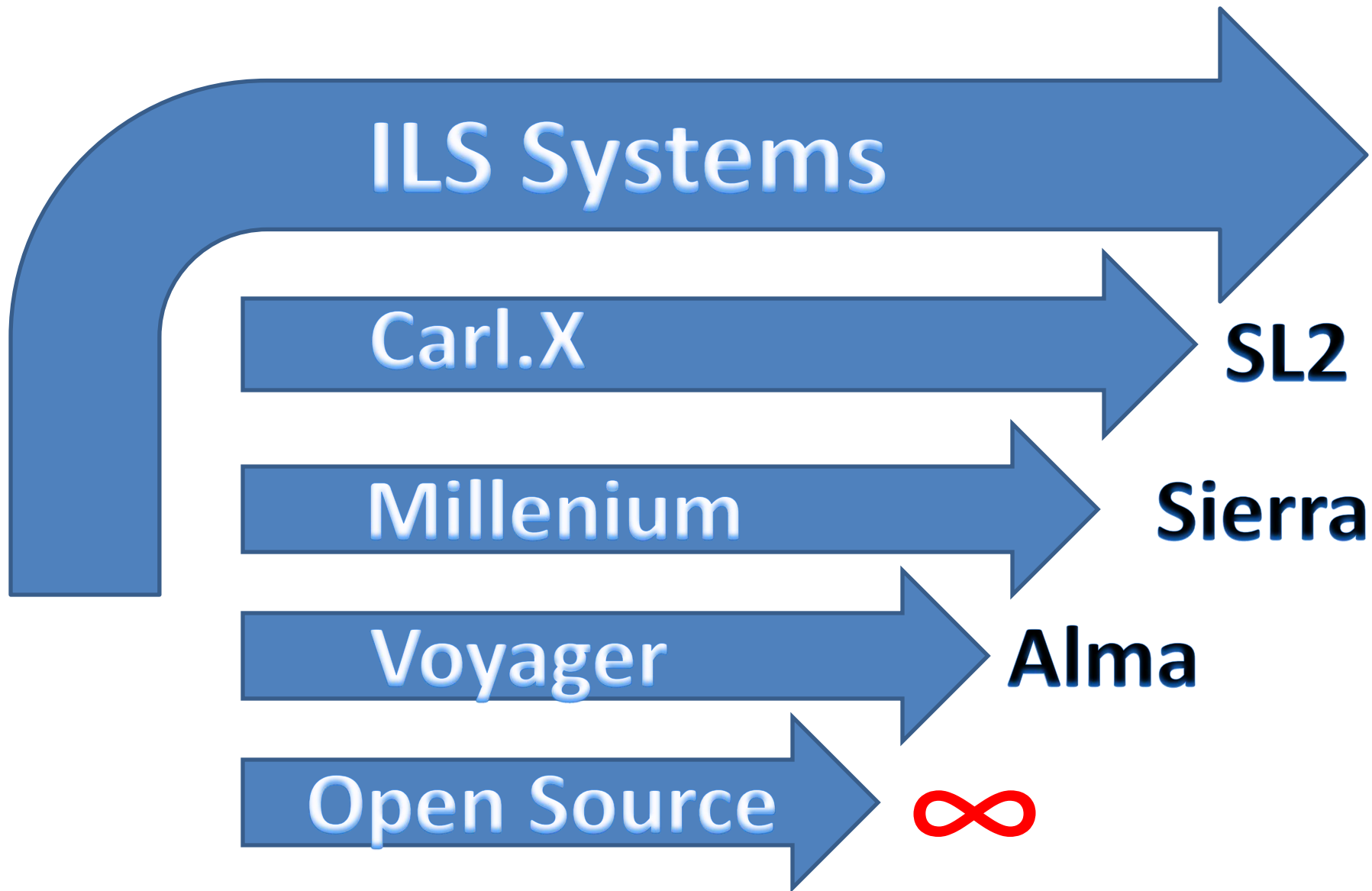


Major Concerns:

CARL•X™

LS2PAC



- More bells and whistles than the current CARL
- Improved terminology and button placement
- More interactive (staff lists, tags)
- Same basic staff interface...no learning curve

- ...Same basic staff interface
- OPAC has an overreliance on pop-up windows
- Not entirely compatible with contemporary browsers
- Basic search underperforms





sierra



- Highly regarded staff module
- Well Regarded migration services
- Good support
- Improved with Encore “discovery service”
- Sierra is touted as being more scalable and architecturally open.
- Sierra will offer a cloud-based storage option

- Millenium notable for its closed architecture
- Millenium looks outdated and Sierra will be in beta
- Bells and whistles add cost
- Lacks interaction
